At the end of the semester, feedback on the curriculum was obtained from all students. The responses were obtained via Google Forms. Following are the highlight of the questions and responses:





Report on Curriculum Feedback – BA 2nd Semester, Department of History

Feedback on the curriculum was obtained from all students at the end of the semester. The responses were obtained through the Google Forms. Following are the highlight of the questions and responses:









As indicated in the above charts, it can be concluded that the curriculum for 2nd Semester B. A. Political Science (Honours) students has been satisfactory with majority of the grading ranging from "Excellent" to "Good" across all the ten (10) parameters.
